I am constantly intrigued by counterintuitive happenings in the world around us. Consider the science of probability and statistics. How unlikely does it seem that in any random group of 30 people, it is more likely than not that two will share a common birthday? Or flip a coin 30 times and keep track of heads and tails. PLAN FOR A BEAUTIFUL 2011; PLANT BULBS THIS FALL!

Given the heat of this past season, even the most devoted gardener can hardly be blamed for threatening to throw in the towel this fall. But this is the time to be looking toward next season—toward those first blooms of the 2011 garden. And there is no better way to usher in a new season than with the insuppressible charm of the minor bulbs.

The minor bulbs offer an early spring shot of welcome relief after the grey of a Kentucky winter. Starting off the bloom season as early as late January, they lead the way into the heart of spring.

The up sides of minors are many. They are inexpensive and easy to plant. Most remain unmolested by rodents or deer and many naturalize well (if you avoid the pre-emergent herbicides) in lawns and beds. Just give them full sun or part shade and minimal fertilizer. We recommend you buy and plant them by the bagfull!

Here are a few of our favorites:



Eranthis hyemalis (winter aconite)

Galanthus nivalis (snowdrops)

Eranthis hyemalis (winter aconite) is one of the best naturalizers for shady areas. The brilliant, sulfuryellow flowers are set off nicely by the glossy green leaves through February and March. Members of the Rannunculaceae (buttercup family.) these 3-4"-tall harbingers of spring can easily be dug, potted and forced indoors for an even earlier shot of color.

Galanthus nivalis (snowdrops) are dainty white gems that usually emerge in mid to late February. The 6"-tall members of the *Liliaceae* (lily family) offer pendulous white flowers, sometimes dotted with green. They are quite inexpensive to buy, but those with an appetite for the unusual can find doubles, ruffled and variegated forms and more. There are more than 100 named forms on the collector's market.

Scilla siberica (Siberian squill) is one of the very best of the blues in the plant world. Growing to 4-6" tall, this member of the *Hyacinthaceae* family is excellent for naturalizing in lawns and tucked into rock gardens. They bloom in March, after the *Galanthus* and *Eranthis* have done their thing. There are pale blue forms, white, and even pink forms. And for the mildly adventurous gardener, there are many other species to be tried.

Puschkinia scilloides (striped squill) is closely related to and often confused with Scilla. Both minors are members of the Hyacinthaceae family, are blueish in flower color and flower at about the same time. However

Puschkinia are typically paler blue with a distinct white center and a deeper colored stripe on the outside of each petal. The flowers are generally upward or outward facing rather than the typically pendant *Scilla*. Puschkinia is excellent in small

containers and dotted through shrub beds.



Leucojum vernum (snowflake)

Leucojum vernum (snowflake) is the latest of the bunch to bloom, offering pendulous cups of green-dotted white atop 8" stems in April. While too tall to naturalize in the lawn, snowflakes are excellent for spotting through perennial and shrub beds. They bloom much longer than most of their cousins, with single plants in bloom lasting three

weeks or more. For the giant among minors, *Leucojum aestivum* (giant snowflake) reaches lofty heights of 12" and blooms a tad later than *L. vernum*.

And while it is not strictly one of the minor bulbs, we offer one small and fabulous tulip—for all you out there that just have to grow one...

Tulipa turkistanica is an excellent species tulip that not only grows in Kentucky; it thrives and multiplies! Plant these in a sunny to partly shady site on dry summer soil and simply enjoy. They aren't deer proof, and the rodents will occasional relocate a few for you, but if you can keep the deer off them, this dainty species will reward with years of mid-spring color. Who says we can't grow good tulips in Kentucky?!




