With the new greenhouse online we have plenty new going on this year but to up the ante, we've decided to tackle a new container plant project. This year we'll be filling some of our containers with a wild array of succulents; tropical and hardy. Horticulture Apprentice Evan Ware put together a great variety of these most accommodating of container plants. Imagine going on vacation for a week and not worrying about watering! Plan a post-Derby visit to check out the plantings.

Visit often this year and remember, we're always happy to have you tap us on the shoulder with a garden question!

What's Bloomin' When . . . and Where?

Yew Dell has thousands of different plants, with something in bloom each month of the year. But be sure to check out these collections when they're in bloom.

- Peonies (both tree and herbaceous) late April through early May around the visitor center.
- Magnolias April, in the arboretum and along the entrance path.
- \bullet Viburnums April/May, in the arboretum, entrance path and Gheens Barn.
- \bullet Dogwoods March/April/May, in the arboretum, entrance path, Gheens Barn and Rock House.
- Bottlebrush Buckeye (Aesculus parviflora) May/June; don't miss these beauties along the event lawn.
- \bullet Hydrangeas just about everywhere on the grounds during the months of May and June .

New bulb plantings worth checking out this spring and summer

- Species tulips that perennialize so much better than the big hybrids look for them near the castle and visitor center entrance
- Daffodils (Narcissus 'Thallia', 'Ice Follies' & 'Barrett Browning') these mixed plantings will make a show in the main parking lot and event lawn.
- Hyacinth Squill (*Scilla hyacinthoides*) an excellent early minor bulb in striking purple/blue! You'll find them along the entrance path.
- Grape Hyacinth (*Muscari latifolium*) super little performer for sun or part shade; purple blooms with fall-emerging foliage. Check them out near the castle and event lawn areas.
- Foxtail Lily (*Eremurus stenophyllus*) a very cool blaze of color in summer, a real head turner. Look for these at the main gate.
- Spring Starflower (*Ipheion uniflorum*) a sun bulb with short clumping foliage and white to pale blue spring flowers. Look for these in the border along the event lawn.
- Flowering onion (*Allium* 'Globemaster') a stunning gigantic ball o' purple! You'll see this new planting near the main gate.

What to do in your garden . . .

We asked Garden Manager, Ann Mattingly, for her recommendations on what we should all be doing in our gardens in the coming months.

Here are a few of her thoughts.

APRIL

- · Remove the remainder of the winter annual weeds
- Cut back remaining perennial stems
- · Direct seed kale, peas, radishes, beets and kohlrabi
- Plant transplants outside; broccoli, Brussels sprouts, cabbage, lettuce and other cool weather crops



MAY

- · Cut branches that have not leafed out (winter damage)
- Plant out tomatoes, peppers, eggplant, potatoes and asparagus
- · Direct seed squash, pumpkins, melons
- Start scouting garden for blister beetles, cabbage loopers and harlequin beetles

JUNE

- Fertilize new plantings
- Keep watering! (think about drip irrigation)
- · Second application of pre-emergent herbicide
- Scout for rose slugs, pine sawfly and treat as soon as they appear

Cornus 'KN30-8' Venus® -**Hybrid dogwood**



One of the most exciting new small flowering trees on the market today, Venus has massive white blooms up to 7" in diameter, excellent summer foliage and brilliant red/orange fall color. Plant in full sun and with plenty of moisture.

Corylopsis spicata – **Spike Winter Hazel**



Outstanding for sun or part shade, winterhazel forms a broad shrub to 6'-8' tall and wide. It produces delicated chartreuse flowers in early spring offering a light fragrance. Fall color is a delightful yellow.

Gymnocladus dioicus - Kentucky Coffee Tree



The State Heritage Tree of Kentucky! Tough as nails, tall grower to 50' with open branching and interesting bark. Huge doubly compound leaves create lacey shade and turn brilliant gold in autumn.

Vernonia lettermannii — **Ironweed**



Little known but a fantastic workhorse for the full sun garden. Growing 1'-2' wide and tall, it forms a tight mound of very fine foliage that is covered with intense purple flowers in summer. Thrives in hot, sunny sites, highly pest resistant and a butterfly magnet. 'Iron Butterfly' is a an excellent cultivar.

Hydrangea quercifolia Compact Oakleaf Hydrangea Selections



Oakleaf is a winner in any shade garden but sometimes it's a bit large. These compact selections will stay about 4' tall and 6' wide. 'Pee Wee' is a loose low grower with bold foliage and white blooms. 'Ruby Slippers' offers compact growth with blooms that fade through deep pink/rose. 'Munchkin' is a tight-growing muffin with upright white blooms.

Solidago 'Solar Cascade' – **Goldenrod**



Don't turn up your nose at this beautiful new offering just because it's a goldenrod. Massive crops of sulfur yellow flowers in late summer cover this 3'-tall mounding and cascading plant. Does best in bright sunny sites and about any soil. Use in sweeps or masses of multiple plants for best effect.



Children's Mini Greenhouse


Making a mini greenhouse out of 2-liter soft drink bottles is a fun and inexpensive way to start plants for your garden. Children will enjoy watching the seeds sprout, roots spread and seedlings develop and mature into plants to be transported to the garden.

2 Liter Bottle Greenhouse

Materials:

Empty clear 2-liter bottle with cap Soilless Planting mix (available at your local garden center) Scissors • Seeds • Plate or tray • Water

- 1. Clean and rinse out the bottle. Remove the outside label by soaking it in hot water, inside and out!
- 2. Dry the bottle.
- 3. Cut the bottle in half, the bottom will be your "planting pot" and the top will be the greenhouse walls.
- 4. Poke about 4 holes in the bottom of the "planting pot" for drainage. Fill with moist soilless planting mix.
- 5. Plant the seeds according to package directions.
- 6. Water the seeds
- 7. Place the top part of the 2-liter over the top of the "planting pot. You may need to make slits in the top to help it fit better.
- 8. Store the bottle in a bright location, but out of full sun. You only have to water if you see the soil drying up.
- 9. When the plants grow large enough, transfer to your garden.
