





#### What's Bloomin' When . . . and Where?

Yew Dell has thousands of different plants, with something in bloom each month of the year. But be sure to check out these collections when they're in bloom.

- Montbretia (Crocosmia 'Lucifer')— June through August, in our Overlook Garden
- Catmint (Nepeta ×faassenii 'Walker's Low') all summer long, multiple garden locations throughout Yew Dell
- Compassplant (Silphium laciniatum) July to September, Overlook Garden
- $\bullet$  Muhly Grass (Muhlenbergia capillaris) August to October, Serpentine Garden

#### What to do in your garden . . .

We asked Garden Manager, Ann Mattingly, for her recommendations on what we should all be doing in our gardens in the coming months. Here are a few of her thoughts.

#### <u>JULY</u>

- $\bullet$  Order fall bulbs, check out Yew Dell's Bulb Sale article on page 7
- Plan your fall vegetable garden
- Begin your seeds for fall veggie transplants
- Deadhead and tidy up perennials such as peonies and hostas

#### **AUGUST**

- Raise the blade on your mower
- · Seed in lettuce, carrots, and other fall vegetable crops
- Keep an eye out for the re-emergence of the Harlequin Bug

#### SEPTEMBER

- · Sow a second succession of seeds for your fall vegetable garden
- Add additional transplants
- · Apply your third and final round of pre-emergent
- Begin thinking of season extending techniques and protect your tender plants from early dips in temperatures
- Apply mulch
- Begin dividing perennials

# Plantings worth checking out this summer and fall

- Elephant's Ears (*Colocasia* 'Mojito') a gorgeous green and purple mottled leaf with coarse, tropical looking foliage. Check it and other cool annuals out in our bed along the event lawn!
- Zahara Double Duo Dahlia and Chilly Chili Ornamental Pepper

   a fun and vibrant combination planted at the entrance to the
   Visitor's Center.
- Check out the kitchen garden for fun and interesting plants such as cardoon, Malabar spinach, ornamental gourds, and an assortment of cool and unusual peppers.
- Muhly Grass (*Muhlenbergia capillaris*) as soon as you walk into the gardens you will see this beautiful, airy grass in the distance. The burgundy flowers and seed heads make a striking show of color and texture for many months in our Serpentine Garden.
- Don't miss the opportunity to see the many plants that come into full glory during the summer and fall months in our Overlook Garden.
- Each year we are asked about the asters growing along Old La Grange Road just outside our fence. *Aster laevis* 'Bluebird' is a native aster with bright, clear purple flowers in September and October. Its shorter stature keeps it from flopping like many other related fall bloomers.

If you're like us, the summer bulb ordering season often skates by before you realize it. You're then left picking through the fall leftovers – often ending up with the same old, same old. To help reverse that trend, we're partnering with some outstanding bulb growers to get orders in early to insure you can get some very cool bulbs for your own garden. Here's how it works . . .

In late June or early July we'll send an email to everyone on our email list (so make sure we have your current email – especially you Insight turned TWC folks!), post on our Facebook page and add to our website the selections we'll have available for order – along with a closing date for orders. Once your order is made and paid for, we'll schedule fall delivery and a pick up day in September when you can come to Yew Dell and collect your bulb booty. Then all you have to do is have a chili party for all your gardening friends so they can help you plant!

The bulb selections will be a combination of uncommon species, unusual varieties of well known species and less common types we've found to be superior selections for our region. Spring bulbs are the best bang for the gardener's buck and these selections will be very cool additions to any garden. Stay tuned and get ready!

# **Growing Young Gardeners**

Want to invite hummingbirds to visit your yard, window, or balcony?

#### PLANT A HUMMINGBIRD GARDEN

Hummingbirds go for red, orange, and purple tube-shaped flowers with lots of nectar in them. No need for a landing pad (they hover) or odor (they don't have a strong sense of smell). Fill a flower pot, window box, or garden patch with their favorites to bring them flocking. Examples are: fuschia, nasturtium, scarlet runner bean, cardinal flower, black & blue salvia and crocosnia lucifer.

#### HANG A HUMMINGBIRD FEEDER:

Option 1: Make a hummingbird feeder from a baby food jar Use a nail to poke a 1/8-inch hole in the lid of a clean baby food jar. Fill the jar with sugar water made with 1/4 cup sugar to 1 cup water and screw on the lid. Add red paint or tape around the hole to attract the birds' attention. Attach wire around the lid to hang the feeder.

Option 2: Make a hummingbird feeder from a plastic bottle, make a hole about 1 inch below from the cap on the side of the bottle. Push a plastic straw through the hole pointing towards the cap. Fill the bottle with water, turn it upside down, and adjust the straw until water fills it up without spilling out. Empty the bottle and glue the straw in place with waterproof glue. Tie a string around the bottle to hang it, and add a circle of red cardboard or plastic around the straw.

Place your hummingbird feeder in a shady area Look for a place with trees or bushes nearby to give hummers somewhere to hide and rest between visits.

Change the hummingbird nectar often in summer To make hummingbird nectar, mix 1/4 cup of sugar with 1 cup of water. Stir until the sugar dissolves. Sugar water spoils quickly in summer heat. Every few days, be sure to scrub your feeder clean, rinse it thoroughly, and refill it. You can keep extra sugar water in the refrigerator for up to 2 weeks.

#### **Hummingbird Fun Facts:**

Hummingbirds are very smart, can remember every flower they have been to, and how long it will take a flower to produce more nectar.

Hummingbirds can see and hear better than humans.

A Hummingbird's heart beats about 250 times per minute at rest vs. normal resting human heart rate of 60-80 beats per minute.

The Hummingbird is one of the smallest birds in the world, weighing only loz.


