\$4 Million Gift to Jump Start Yew Dell Nursery Project

Talk about a sweet-15 birthday present! One of Yew Dell's anonymous angels has made a major pledge to allow us to greatly expand our nursery operation. Not only will this help us conduct more plant evaluations, grow better plants for the collections and greatly improve the plant offerings at our annual Plant Sale, it will allow us to take plant production at Yew Dell to the next level.

With this incredible leadership gift, we are currently working to hire a Greenhouse & Nursery Manager, designing greatly expanded plant production facilities and planning to launch a commercial production nursery. The long term plan for this facility is to help us get better plants out to the industry and generate a sustainable income stream to help support Yew Dell's annual operations.

In addition to expansion of nursery operations, this new effort will allow our Garden Manager and horticulture staff to focus more on the gardens rather than splitting time between nursery, greenhouse and gardens. Happy Birthday to us!

ON THE COVER: Albizia julibrissin 'Summer Chocolate'

Albizia julibrissin 'Summer Chocolate' is a stunning, burgundy-leafed mimosa growing near the Visitor Center at Yew Dell. Mimosas can be a bit invasive but we treat this specimen as a cut-back shrub to eliminate that potential. By cutting it to the ground each winter, we cut off the flower buds for the coming season (so no seed is produced) and the plant produces more vigorous growth with excellent foliage color.

New QR Code Tour of Yew Dell Unveiled

We're delighted to announce our newest interpretive addition to Yew Dell's grounds, thanks to a grant from the Oldham County Community Foundation. The next time you come out you'll see about two dozen laminated signs for our new "Yew Know What" tour. Scan the square QR code with your smart phone and it will download a page of information about . . . the Castle, the Holly Allee or whatever sign you scan.



To scan a code you'll need a QR reader smart phone app that can be downloaded from the App Store (iPhone) or Google Play shop (Android). Just go to the appropriate store for your device, search for QR Reader and download any one of the many free applications. Then when you are on the grounds, just launch the app, point your phone at the QR Code and it'll do the rest!

The QR Code signs are temporary right now for initial testing purposes – we'll have more permanent signs in the near future. We also plan to add an audio file to each station so you can listen rather than read.

We often get phone calls from inquiring minds looking for the perfect tree – something that'll grow anywhere, flower for twelve months, produce edible fruit in colors ranging from Smurf blue to glimmering gold. . . Oh, and they have to be immune to all insect and disease problems, take out the trash and fold the laundry. No problem!

And while honoring that full criteria list would be tough, there are some options that come darned close. The ironwoods (*Parrotia* species) are at the head of that auspicious list.

Named for the 19th century German naturalist, Friedrich Parrot (who was the first recorded mountaineer to lead an expedition to the summit of Mt. Ararat!) the two species are known for outstanding ornamental characteristics and tremendous adaptability. They hit that medium-sized sweet spot for garden trees. They don't have the miserably competitive roots that make the larger maples such awful garden citizens. And while their early spring blooms won't inspire copious lines of iambic pentameter, the trees are tough, durable and tremendously attractive in the garden.

Persian Ironwood (*Parrotia persica*) — While not a household name in most normal households, this species has been a darling in plant circles for 30 years or more. It boasts 30-40' of upright oval height, dense, glossy and dark green summer foliage and fall color that ranges from yellow to orange, red and deep burgundy. On mature plants the bark exfoliates somewhat like a lacebark elm.

When it comes to cultivation, Persian ironwood will grow just about anywhere there isn't standing water. Indeed this was one of the standout successes of the massive street tree planting effort in Atlanta leading up to the 1996 Olympics. Tough enough for me!

There are tighter than normal, upright cultivars ('Vanessa'), variegated forms ('Lamplighter') and even a couple of to-die-for weepers ('Pendula' and 'Kew Weeper'.)

The Chinese ironwood (*P. subaequalis*) was only first discovered by science back in the late 1980s – as a highly endangered group of fewer than 100 plants in eastern China. A tad smaller than its Persian cousin, *P. subaequalis* has proven to be a first rate garden plant at Yew Dell. Multi-trunked, broadly upright and growing in a tough spot, it grows quickly, roots easily and has the most stunning fall foliage color of anything in the garden. Leaves are the first to turn - a dark burgundy - and remain attractive until about all other plants have dropped their leaves. It'll take a bit of searching (like sifting through next spring's Plant Sale!) but is well worth the effort.

THANKS AND BEST WISHES TO GARDEN MANAGER, TED MARTINI



GROWING YOUNG GARDENERS

SALT DOUGH LEAF BOWL CRAFT



Making salt dough leaf bowls is a perfect way to bring in the new season. It's a fun craft for kids of all ages. The first thing to do is go on a nature walk to collect leaves. If all of the leaves have fallen, don't worry, you can buy artificial leaves at a craft store.

Salt Dough

Materials:

- -2 cups flour
- -1 cup salt
- -1 cup water

Mix and knead for a few minutes. Wrap in plastic wrap and rest for 40 minutes

Leaf bowls

Materials:

Salt dough

Leaves

Rolling pin

Sharp knife

Cooking Spray

Small ovenproof bowl


Cookie sheet

Paint

Mod Podge

- 1. Using the rolling pin, roll the salt dough to 1/4" thickness.
- 2. Place your leaf vein side down onto the dough.
- 3. Press with the rolling pin and fingers all over the leaf. You want to get the veins to print on the dough. <u>Peel away leaf</u> (save for another)
- 4. Using the knife carefully cut around all edges of the leaf imprint.
- 5. Spray outside of ovenproof bowl with cooking spray and place upside-down on the cookie sheet.
- 6. Carefully lift the dough and place on a bowl with leaf imprint side down.
- 7. Bake in a 250 degree oven for 2 hours.
- 8. Remove from oven and cool for 15 minutes before taking off of the bowl.
- 9. Paint, let dry and coat with Mod Podge for a nice finish.
