





NOTES FROM THE NURSERY BY JACOB STIDHAM

Sayde calls us boujee for using shade cloth in the nursery to provide our plants a happier environment. Boujee is a slang term for the act of living a fancy, sophisticated lifestyle usually above your means. If you know me, you certainly know I'm not fancy or sophisticated . . . or even boujee, but that shade cloth sure works great! I guess the shoe fits.



But what is this shade cloth and why do we use it? The nursery is an inhospitable place during the summer. There are no shade trees and if you have ever walked into a greenhouse in the summer, you'll know that it can get so hot that it can take your breath away. These large pieces of heavy-duty cloth are a knitted or woven netting that blocks some sunlight but still lets some through. The more dense the knitting or weave, the less light passes through. We have used different types for different crops, but it is always for the same purpose, to lower light levels and decrease temperatures for our young plants. If you have ever been to Yew Dell on a hot summer day and walked from the sun into the shade of the American beech trees that line the walkway between the Walled Garden and Martha Lee's Kitchen, you have felt the temperature drop tremendously! That is what we are going for in the nursery but without the trees.

Our newest project with shade cloth is placing a 60% shade on our 30'x96' greenhouse. We have been using this house to grow annuals and perennials only in late winter and spring but with the new shade in the summer, we will be transitioning it to a year-round house for growing shade perennials. A nursery and greenhouse operation may look like a bunch of gravel, metal, and plastic but it truly is a living environment that we are continually tweaking to get the most and best use out of. 

Castle Gardens Campaign Update

We are so close to our goal of \$5 million! Now is the time to join our effort to transform the area around Yew Dell's iconic castle.



Every capital campaign project has its fun parts – designing water features, plant selection . . . and more plant selection. But then there are those parts that, while not featured in the headlines, are the bits and pieces that make it all come together in the end. Here's a snapshot of a few of those important parts that our team has been working through as we prepare for construction:

New Plant Production – Since we will produce most of the plants for the new Castle Terrace Gardens project, new nursery and greenhouse manager, Jeff Margreiter and nursery assistant, Cosmo Bosela, will have a big planning project on their hands. What to grow from seed... and when to start. What to produce from cuttings... and when to start. What to grow from purchased plugs... and when to start. Seeing a trend here?

Plant Relocation – There are some important parts of our plant collections that currently call the castle area their home. And even if they will be part of the finished plant palette, they need to be relocated during construction. And coordinating the fundraising progress, design completion, construction planning and when to dig/move existing plants . . . well, that's a tricky project.

Visitor Circulation – Since we'll have the castle area torn up for a while, this summer we added a new entrance path near the Visitor Center. It's part of our long term circulation master plan and will provide a safe walkway for visitors during construction.

Utilities, Utilities – From accommodating the City of Crestwood's planned sanitary sewer expansion to design and installation of new irrigation systems, providing lighting for evening events... There seems to be a never-ending list of utility issues that need to be addressed before we turn the first spade of soil.

Our hope is that visitors carry this knowledge from Yew Dell to their home gardens and put it to use making healthier ecosystems and more inspiring gardens.

NOTES FROM THE GARDENS BY SAYDE HECKMAN

Awww, if only we could be as boujee as the Yew Dell Nursery and Research Greenhouses, with their fancy shade cloths and automatic misting systems to keep their garden plants cool and happy. Unfortunately, in the gardens we have to plant our baby one gallon Bigleaf Magnolia (Magnolia macrophylla) and wait at least 10 years before it shades anything rhyming with Hosta, Fern, or Barrenwort. It's tough being a gardener!

Despite not having those fancy nursery tools to protect our garden from the sun, there are a lot of fun ways to play with the specimens in your garden, to take advantage of what you have. The three most important rules in any garden are...

- 1. Not being afraid to experiment and try new things
- 2. Remove and/or relocate specimens that aren't performing well
- 3. Variety is the spice of life! Plant perennials, bulbs, annuals, trees, shrubs, and more!

Throughout the gardens at Yew Dell, we have a lot of tricky sun exposure situations and microclimates, some occurring all in the same garden! Garden staff have been utilizing tropicals and annuals for these problem areas since 2019 and we have learned a lot along the way.





Millstone Garden

In 2019, this area was hit by an EF-1 tornado that carried away the big old White Pine (*Pinus strobus*) turning this once shade garden into an instant sun garden. It was an unfortunate loss, but in the end, it simply opened the doors to more plants! Since then, we've been working on:

- 1. Re-establishing the tree canopy
- 2. Relocating the existing shade perennials to better suited garden locations
- 3. Planting new sun perennials, to take advantage of the new sun exposure
- 4. Add sun annuals for temporary color while other plants settle in and mature

Glen Garden

In the summer of 2017 this garden went through a renovation with the addition of the decorative creek bed, Adirondack chairs, stone path, and new perennial plantings. With the established evergreen tree canopy the soil is overly dry, coarse, and a challenge to garden. We decided to experiment by incorporating annuals and some tough shrubs into the design, to see which would perform best in the crumby soil and differing sun exposures.

Come check it out next time you're in the gardens!



So far, the best performers in morning sun have been Main Street Coleus (*Plectranthus scutellarioides* 'Yonge Street') and *Caladium* (*Caladium* 'Miss Moffet').



And in late afternoon sun exposure, Main Street Coleus (*Plectranthus scutellarioides* 'Venice Boulevard') alongside Strawberry Sundae™ Panicle Hydrangea (*Hydrangea paniculata* 'Rensun').

THE Image Missing BY BRAD KESSANIS

While Yew Dell might be best known for formal gardens and historic structures, guests are also encouraged to take an adventure on our peaceful woodland trail system. This scenic trail system provides approximately 1.2 miles of easy hiking for all ages, two lakes, and opportunities to see a diverse variety of wildlife. Once utilized by the Klein family as a pasture for livestock, the woodlands have now been allowed to naturally grow into a recreational area where guests can get exercise, bird watch, identify native flora, relax, and enjoy a forested area.



Some of the wildlife that you'll find along the trails include deer, egrets, blue heron, kingfishers, turtles and bob white quail, just to name a few.

In the Spring you will enjoy displays of redbuds, dogwoods, and spring ephemerals, while in the Fall you will be surrounded and engulfed by an illuminating red, yellow, and orange forest canopy.



Another nice feature includes a small waterfall that flows year-round due to the natural springs that feed the two lakes.

During your visits, you will find the woodlands are not just a nice addition to our pristine gardens, but they are an enjoyable entity in themselves.

As part of the evening, we recognized our Volunteer of the Year: Kate Pfeifer!


