

Orange-barked Japanese Maple (Acer palmatum 'Bihou'). This outstanding specimen offers bright yellow-green summer leaves that turn a rich red-orange in the fall. As the fall foliage drops, the bark transforms to a brilliant orange that lasts the entire winter. This is an extremely rare plant that was only recently imported from Japan.

### PLAYING FAVORITES...

We thought you might be interested to know what plants Yew Dell's own staff and volunteers would say are some of their favorites. It seemed an easy enough request, but when the results came in, it was clear that choosing only one was a challenge.

### Paul Cappiello, Executive Director

Daphne xburkwoodii 'Gold Dust'; variegated burkwood daphne

This plant has become a favorite in the sunken rock garden. It will grow 3' tall x 4' wide. Rather slow growing, it is grown for its spring (mid to late April) pale pink sweetly fragrant flowers, and fine-textured, goldedged leaves. 'Gold Dust' needs a moist, well-drained soil in sun to part shade. It's a bit difficult to grow but well worth the



effort. We are rooting cuttings and hope to have some available for next year's plant sale.

### Jo Anne Fischer, Garden Manager

Indigofera amblyantha; Asian false indigo

This 8' tall, fountain-like shrub provides delicately fine texture for the summer garden. From late April through first frost, plants produce an abundance of pink candle-like blossoms along every stem. Tolerant of sun and part shade and any soil except extremely wet, it will perform admirably in almost any garden in our



region. It also makes a great addition to large mixed container plantings. Our specimen is planted next to the Rock House.

### Adam Parman, Summer Intern, Student at University of Kentucky

Albizia julibrissin 'Summer Chocolate'; purple-leafed mimosa

Many of us grew up knowing mimosa as a lacey, green-leafed, sprawling tree with powderpuff pink summer blossoms. 'Summer Chocolate' is a stunning burgundy-leafed form



that offers outstanding foliage color throughout the growing season. Since mimosa can be quite invasive, we grow it only as a cut-back shrub. Each winter, we cut back the plant to 2-3' tall, removing the flower buds and thereby eliminating any flowers and seed. And the subsequent vigorous foliage growth is spectacular. See our best specimen growing along the Red Barn path.

Abi Rennekamp, Loyal Volunteer (So loyal in fact, we let her choose two favorites)



Fagus sylvatica 'Klein Copper'; purple-leaf European beech

European beech makes an outstanding specimen tree in its own right. But 'Klein Copper' sets the bar one notch higher. Spring foliage emerges a mixture of bright new-penny copper and deep burgundy. The color holds well into the summer and eventually fades to a deep, rich purplish-green. This is a tree for large open lawns

and deep rich soils. Our specimen is located in the arboretum.




### Hydrangea quercifolia 'Shannon'

Oakleaf hydrangea is a staple in the Kentucky landscape, but you've not seen the best until you've seen 'Shannon', a Theodore Klein selection, in full bloom. Rather than the typical 4-sepaled white flowers, 'Shannon' offers double flowers with more than 20 sepals/flower. As they age, the basal sepals turn a rich mahogany, giving the entire plant a unique and beautiful appearance. Plant in partial shade

in rich soil for best growth. Yew Dell's specimen is growing along the drive across from the Serpentine Garden.





### **ENGLAND CONTINUED FROM COVER**


